## Fab Four serenades Atlanta onto the world's stage

It was 1965, Atlanta was striding onto the world's stage, and the Beatles played our walk-on music.

They were heady times for a small Southern town with big talk and even bigger aspirations.

Downtown sprouted with skyscrapers and hotels. Martin Luther King Jr. had just been awarded the Nobel Peace Prize the previous year, and the city's leaders, black and white, turned out to celebrate.

More excitement was in the works. During his 1961 campaign, Ivan Allen had promised to bring a stadium and big league sports to Atlanta. In April, 1965, Mayor Allen delivered the first half of the deal, and Atlanta Stadium materialized on Capitol Avenue like the spare tire of some colossal Buick.

The only problem was a nasty lawsuit by the city of Milwaukee

that kept the Braves in the frozen north for one more season.

To help fill those empty seats, in between games by the Atlanta Crackers, the stadium sought attractions. It caught a juggernaut.

In a young town, shaking off its dusty antebellum associations, the four British mop-tops were the perfect act to play for a coming-out party.

"Atlanta was becoming fair-haired child, and in 1965 it was right on the cusp," said Cliff Kuhn, associate professor of history at Georgia State University. Soon the city would have Major League Baseball and an NFL team. And right there, in the middle of August, it had the Beatles.

"It is kind of a coming of age in Atlanta," said Kuhn. "We've been aspiring and striving to become a national city and here we've arrived."

## In 1965, Beatles christen new stadium with a bang

When the Beatles played Atlanta Stadium on August 18, 1965, they were the biggest thing to hit town since "Gone With the Wind."

Here's what it was like:  
■ The Beatles' entire 10-hour visit to Atlanta was spent inside the stadium, and in limos riding to and from the airport. Rumors were rife that they would arrive in a helicopter. They didn't. The stadium authority didn't want aircraft messing up the grass in the outfield.

■ Tickets were \$4.50 for the cheap seats, \$5.50 for the good ones. Though the stadium (later renamed Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium) held 50,000, only 34,000 seats were sold.



■ The sound system in Atlanta included an innovation unknown elsewhere: monitors. These allowed the Beatles, for the first time, to hear themselves over the screams of their fans. Beatles manager Brian Epstein sent the engineers at Baker Audio a thank you note saying the sound was "Excellent. Without question proved the most effective of all during our U.S. tour 1965."

■ The stadium was built with the promise that the Braves baseball team would arrive from Milwaukee that spring, but a lawsuit detained the Braves up north until the end of the 1965 season. In their absence the Atlanta Crackers played in the stadium, seeing only small crowds. The Beatles performance in August drew international attention to Atlanta's new downtown jewel, and inaugurated the stadium with a bang.

■ Bob Hope, later the director of public relations for the Braves organization, was a 19-year-old usher at the show, and remembers that there were 15 rows of wooden sawhorses on the field between the audience and the performers, and these were enough to slow down overexcited female fans who climbed the fence and tried to rush the stage. "We'd count how many they could get over before they were stopped... I don't think any got over more than 13."

■ In the weeks leading up to the show the news was saturated with stories about the Fab Four. Coverage of the show itself elicited four pages of pictures and stories in The Atlanta Constitution and six pages in The Atlanta Journal.

■ The concert grossed \$138,000, the biggest show ever for promoter Ralph Brigades, but the band took \$88,000 of that and expenses ate up much of the rest.

■ Dick Cecil, head of Braves Productions, arrived in town ahead of the baseball team, and aggressively courted the Beatles as part of his commitment to keep the stadium busy. Cecil left a dozen baseballs for the rockers to autograph, which he handed out to other members of the Braves organization. He discovered later on that some functionary actually did the autographing.

■ Paul Drew, DJ at radio station WQXI, was the onstage master of ceremonies and introduced the band to the audience, as Ed Sullivan had done at Shea Stadium. Several bootlegged tapes of the show have circulated for years. Drew made a tape of a rehearsal, with a recorder that he hid under his seat on the second row.

■ Mayor Ivan Allen attended the concert and awarded John, Paul, George and Ringo the key to the city. He compared the concert to the premiere of "Gone With the Wind," and said "They're excellent boys. The only improvement I'd make... I'd cut their hair a little bit."

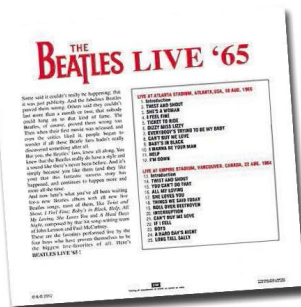

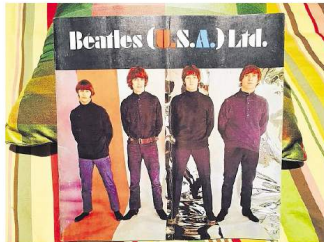
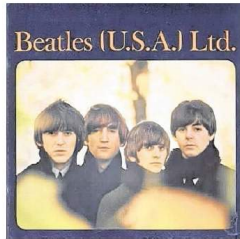

Explosion Lights Up Night Sky

Debris Believed Sighted in Search
CHICAGO (UPI) — A New York-to-Chicago United Airlines jet airplane crashed in a burst of flames and falling debris Monday night with 28 persons aboard.

There were unconfirmed reports that the Coast Guard boats and circling Navy planes and helicopters had circled the wreckage in the black waters near miles off Port Sheridan, Ill., and 25 miles north of the airport.

There was no doubt in the searchers' mind that the plane which was on its 100th flight 300 miles to land minutes after its Chicago flight, crashed at Chicago's O'Hare airport.

The three-jet Boeing 727 airplane carried a crew of six and 21 passengers.

United Air Lines in New York issued a statement saying, "The Los Angeles flight en route from La Guardia Field to O'Hare Air Field, designated Monday night over Lake Michigan and is presumed to have crashed."

THE U.S. Coast Guard was alerted at Chicago, W. Va., and at the office of Major Marshall White, 12th Air Force commander, at the 3rd office of Major L. S. Smith, 3rd Air Force.
